This four-part video series begins with an overview of the definition and characteristics of dyslexia, followed by an explanation of the relationship between reading development and dyslexia. Next, common questions about dyslexia and services offered under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) are answered. The series ends with a description of what a structured literacy approach to reading instruction means, and what this looks like for students with dyslexia. Legislation

[Georgia Early Literacy Act \(H.B. 538\)](#)

Passed in 2023, this law requires schools to screen K-3 students for reading difficulties and create an intervention plan for identified students. It also requires reading training for all teachers of K-3 students and the use of high quality instructional materials for teaching reading.

[Georgia's Dyslexia law \(S.B. 48\)](#)

Passed in 2019, this law requires that K-3 students be screened for characteristics of dyslexia. It also established the Georgia Dyslexia Informational Handbook and Georgia Dyslexia Endorsement and required training on dyslexia for current and preservice teachers.

[Georgia Council on Literacy \(S.B. 211\)](#)

Passed in 2023, this law established the Georgia Council on Literacy to oversee state literacy needs and work to improve outcomes.
